I would never believed that I achieved my BSC honours degree, never mind doing my MSC, but it requires extra work being disabled; I am not a fast typer, and the motivation to write academically on a Master's is non-existent sometimes. Why am I still here? The answer is I can't work in McDonald's or stock the shelves at M&S; I am joking. However, everyone has a life purpose (a goal), and I aim to become a game developer. Everyone should have a purpose, and they should get the necessary help. Nowadays, computers have specialised tools that assist someone with a disability in reaching their potential. No, it is entirely impossible in that sense, professional male football because I can't walk.
